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Another Sabbath test	
■ <u>Luke 14:1</u>	
It happened that when He went into the house of one of the leaders of the	
Pharisees on the Sabbath to eat bread, they were watching Him closely.	
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The "Lord of the Sabbath" confronts	
its current caretakers	
■ Luke 14:2 – 4a	
And there in front of Him was a man suffering from dropsy. And Jesus	
answered and spoke to the lawyers and Pharisees, saying, "Is it lawful to heal on	
the Sabbath, or not?" But they kept silent.	
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They will keep water from killing an	
ox on Sabbath but not a man	
■ <u>Luke 14:4b-6</u>	
And He took hold of him and healed him, and sent him away. And He said to them,	
"Which one of you will have a son or an ox fall into a well, and will not immediately	
pull him out on a Sabbath day?" And they	

could make no reply to this.

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They were watching Jesus, now He watches them	
■ <u>Luke 14:7</u>	
And He began speaking a parable to the invited guests when He noticed how they had been picking out the places of honor at the table, saying to them,	
and the same, surjoining to allow,	
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Their love of honor could backfire	
■ <u>Luke 14:8, 9</u>	
"When you are invited by someone to a	
wedding feast, do not take the place of honor, for someone more distinguished	
than you may have been invited by him,	
and he who invited you both will come and say to you, 'Give your place to this man,'	
and then in disgrace you proceed to	
occupy the last place."	
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Allow someone else to determine	
your status	
■ <u>Luke 14:10</u>	
"But when you are invited, go and recline at the last place, so that when the one who	
has invited you comes, he may say to you,	
'Friend, move up higher'; then you will have honor in the sight of all who are at the table	
with you."	

Theme in Luke: reversal	
■ <u>Luke 14:11</u>	
For everyone who exalts himself will be humbled, and he who humbles himself will be exalted.	
■ <u>Luke 1:52</u>	
He has brought down rulers from their thrones, And has exalted those who were humble. (Mary)	
Humble. (Waly)	
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Reward: high social status	
= Luko 14:12	
And He also went on to say to the one who had invited Him, "When you give a luncheon or a dinner, do not invite your	
friends or your brothers or your relatives or rich neighbors, otherwise they may also invite you in return and that will be your repayment."	
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Reward: Eschatological Blessings	
= Luko 14:12-14	
■ <u>Luke 14:13, 14</u>	
But when you give a reception, invite the poor, the crippled, the lame, the blind, and you will be blessed, since they do not have	
the means to repay you; for you will be repaid at the resurrection of the righteous.

Haman came in and the king said to him, "What is to be done for the man whom the king desires to honor?" And Haman said to himself, "Whom would the king desire to honor more than me?"

1) Avoid the attitude of self importance	
■ <u>Luke 20:46, 47a</u>	
Beware of the scribes, who like to walk around in long robes, and love respectful greetings in the market places, and chief	
seats in the synagogues and places of honor at banquets, who devour widows' houses, and for appearance's sake offer long prayers.	

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It is imperative that we humble ourselves	
■ <u>1Peter 5:5b</u>	
all of you, clothe yourselves with humility	
toward one another, for God is opposed to	
the proud, but gives grace to the humble.	
and product satisfied grade to the mamble.	
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2) It is imperative that we humble ourselves	
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■ <u>James 4:10</u>	
Humble yourselves in the presence of the	
Lord, and He will exalt you.	
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3) The only status that matters is the status we

■ 2Corinthians 10:18	
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For it is not he who commends himself	
that is approved, but he whom the Lord	
commends.

■ Matthew 6:1	
Beware of practicing your righteousness	
before men to be noticed by them;	
otherwise you have no reward with your Father who is in heaven.	
■ Galatians 6:3	
For if anyone thinks he is something when he is nothing, he deceives himself.

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■ <u>James 2:1, 2</u>	
My brethren, do not hold your faith in our	
glorious Lord Jesus Christ with an attitude of personal favoritism. For if a man comes	
into your assembly with a gold ring and	
dressed in fine clothes, and there also	
comes in a poor man in dirty clothes,	
4) We should not base our friendships and

■ <u>James 2:3, 4</u>	
and you pay special attention to the one who is wearing the fine clothes, and say,	
"You sit here in a good place," and you say	
to the poor man, "You stand over there, or sit down by my footstool," have you not	
made distinctions among yourselves, and	
become judges with evil motives?
